From the Vice Rector -

Evangelism:

Recently I witnessed a Facebook spat, in which some of our conservatives were laying into a prominent inclusive Christian because one of her / his churches had a Sunday attendance of 30. Their argument was "look, inclusive Christianity doesn't work. Try it and you will drive everyone away and end up with empty churches"

Now there are so many flaws in that argument. Our inclusive vicar would not get to be vicar of a multi church benefice in an urban setting if the individual churches had been put together already because they were struggling before s/he arrived.

And then there is the way we tend to play the numbers game. A vicar who grows their Sunday mass attendance from 25 to 30 is still seen as something of a failure. While a vicar with a church of 400 - well he (and it usually is a "he") is seen as an "important vicar" and a "success" even if Sunday attendance was 450 when he arrived there and he has grown the church by a massive minus fifty.

Then there are other factors like changes in demographics in the local area. And then there are (too sadly) many who have been hurt by the behaviour of conservative evangelicals and say "If evangelism comes as part of THAT package, I want nothing to do with it."

Yet - despite these flaws - I want to suggest that this argument of our conservative sisters and brothers is worth engaging with. A surprisingly effective way of convincing them that there is something in inclusive catholic Christianity is to show them that we too are interested in introducing people to Jesus and his body.

Of course that is not why we do evangelism. We do evangelism because we believe in a liberating and loving God who cared so much about every single person on this planet and particularly about the marginalised and rejected. We tell people about God's love, because, (despite the ways sometimes the institutional Church has so sadly proved the opposite) we believe a relationship with

God is good news for people. It brings life in all it's fullness.

So it is not to prove a point to our conservative colleagues that we do evangelism. Yet is a surprisingly effective way of demonstrating to them that inclusive Christians are worth listening to. Take Bishop Cottrell for example, a member of this society, someone who is utterly uncompromising in his commitment to inclusivity. Yet huge numbers of evangelicals - however conservative their views on sexuality - read his books, listen to him and pay attention to what he says. Or take Revd Sally Hitchiner - openly gay - yet widely respected in more conservative circles because of her very public commitment to evangelism.

People's hearts change slowly - but if we can convince them that we are not of the devil, and that we are worth listening to in other areas, perhaps eventually and one by one we can also persuade them we are worth listening to on the issue of inclusivity.
